The in-house inmate population on the first day of the onsite review was 952. All reasonable efforts were made to conduct the required number of targeted inmate interviews. The auditor selected additional inmates from the available targeted populations and increased the number of random inmate interviews to ensure that the appropriate numbers of inmates were interviewed. There was a total of 30 formal inmate interviews conducted. The auditor selected inmates randomly by using a full roster provided at the beginning of the on-site review. Interviews were conducted with at least one inmate for each living area of the facility and included both male and female inmates.</p>

Both the PREA Compliance Manager and PREA Coordinator felt they have enough time to manage all of their PREA-related responsibilities. The PREA Compliance Manager stated he meets regularly with facility leadership and has sufficient authority to implement changes as needed. TPREA Coordinator handles day to day PREA related issues and consults regularly with the PREA Compliance Manager.

Site Review Observations:

1. Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The Riverside Regional Jail (RRJ) has a written policy (11.1 Sexual Misconduct) mandating zero tolerance relating to sexual assault and sexual harassment. The policy also states that all sexual behavior is strictly prohibited inside of the RRJ.

"The Riverside Regional Jail is a Zero Tolerance facility committed to deterring, preventing and investigating all incidents of sexual misconduct to ensure a safe environment for all employees, contracted personnel, visitors, volunteers, and inmates."

The written policy discusses the agency's approach to training employees, volunteers and contractors preventing, detecting, and responding to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The policy also addresses staff's duty to report.

RRJ policy also addresses inmate orientation and education during the booking and classification process where they receive their initial PREA information. The information includes the agencies sexual assault policy, prevention and intervention, self-protection, reporting sexual abuse and treatment and counseling.

(b) The agency has a designated PREA Compliance Manager who reports directly to the Superintendent. During the interview, he stated as the "PREA Compliance Manager he has sufficient time and authority to develop, implement, and oversee agency efforts to comply with the PREA standards".

(c) The RRJ only operates one facility, however it has a designated PREA Coordinator who reported during her interview that she has sufficient time to develop, implement and oversee agency efforts.

The Auditor conducted a thorough review of the agency's policies and procedures, Organizational Chart, and interviewed staff and inmates. The Auditor determined the agency has developed an appropriate zero tolerance policy which includes prevention, detection and response techniques to all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. An appropriate staff member has been designated to develop, implement, and oversee the agency's and facility's PREA efforts. The Riverside Regional Jail has successfully created a zero-tolerance culture towards all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The Auditor determined the facility's Zero-Tolerance culture has resonates with staff and inmates. The Riverside Regional Jail maintains one facility and has appointed a PREA Coordinator and PREA Compliance Manager. Based upon the review and analysis of all of the available evidence, the auditor has determined that the agency is fully compliant with this standard.

Interviews with the Superintendent, PREA Compliance Manager and PREA Coordinator confirmed that the Riverside Regional Jail has developed a staffing plan and has adopted generally accepted detention and correctional practices. Additionally, the staffing plan is reviewed annually by the Superintendent, PREA Coordinator as well as other jail leadership including the PREA Compliance Manager. All indicated that issues that are identified are prioritized and addressed as needed. The Superintendent indicated that staffing shortages have not been an issue recently and that overtime is authorized when necessary. Any drop below minimum staffing is reported to facility leadership.

Interviews with Sergeants and Lieutenants confirmed that unannounced rounds are done on all shifts at varied times. Both indicated that rounds are documented in the "Supervisory Rounds Log."

Random inmate interviews confirmed that they regularly see supervisors in the housing units and other areas in the facility.

Site Review Observations:

1. Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The RRJ has developed and documented the staffing plan and has adopted generally accepted detention and correctional practices. The staffing plan is prepared annually by the PREA Coordinator and reviewed by the Superintendent, and jail leadership including the PREA Compliance Manager. Changes are made as necessary.

Virginia State statute mandates that female staff is on duty at all times. The staffing analysis considers:

The PREA Coordinator indicated during her interview that she meets with transgender inmates to determine their preference of staff to be searched by.

Random staff interviews reiterated that they have not conducted cross-gender strip searches or cross gender visual body cavity searches. Staff interviews confirmed that they announce themselves or will announce staff of a different gender prior to entering the housing unit

Random inmate interviews confirmed they have not been strip searched or visual body cavity searched by a staff member of the opposite sex. Inmate interviews indicated that announcements by staff are being made when staff enter housing areas.

Interviews with random female inmates stated that “pat down searches are always conducted by female staff and they have access to regularly available programming which includes out of cell opportunities”.

Two transgender inmates were interviewed and both indicated they were asked about their preference of gender to conduct searches. Interviews indicated they were not physically examined for the sole purpose of determining the genital status.

Site Review Observations:

Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) RRJ policy states staff will not conduct cross-gender strip searches or cross gender visual body cavity searches except in exigent circumstances or when performed by medical practitioners. Per policy, all strip searches are documented.

(b) Private areas were seen in Booking to conduct strip searches. Two staff were present for the searches, one conducts the search and one remains outside of the room. During the on-site there was a number of female staff available to conduct searches of female inmates. At least one female staff member is assigned to the facility at all times.

A number of pat-searches were observed during the onsite visit. Searches were conducted by appropriate staff, no issues were identified.

(c) The facility documents all strip searches however RRJ policy states staff will not

During interviews with random staff, they stated each inmate is provided PREA information upon arrival. Booking and Classification staff were asked how the facility ensures inmates who are disabled or do not speak English benefit from the agency's information and education. Staff stated information would be brought to an inmate who may come into the facility and are sent straight to the medical area due to their medical status. Other inmates receive information after they have been treated or stabilized from a temporary disability and are able to comprehend the information and education.

Random staff were asked about the use inmate interpreters. Each stated they do not use inmates to interpret information to inmates. Staff informed the auditor they have select staff who are bilingual and have access to an interpretation service by phone.

Site Review Observations:

1. Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The Auditor reviewed the RRJ New Intake Information form. The form is provided to each inmate during the booking process. The inmate information form is maintained in English and Spanish. The Auditor observed the agency's PREA posters in all facility areas. Agency posters include English and Spanish. In the event the facility receives an inmate who is blind or has low vision the facility ensures a staff member reads the PREA information to the inmate. Additionally, many signs, including signs for the PREA hotline are available in braille. Booking and Classification staff take appropriate steps to ensure an inmate with intellectual disabilities understands the agency's PREA information through a one on one session with the inmate.

Inmates who cannot read English or Spanish can benefit from the facility's PREA information through use of *Voiance Language Services LLC*. The facility maintains a Language Line telephone in the intake area. The RRJ employs bilingual staff who can interpret for non-English speaking inmates. There is a TDD telephone located in booking so staff may communicate with deaf or hard of hearing inmates. The PREA video is available in both English and Spanish. Each inmate is required to sign the acknowledgement form after receiving facility information and education.

(b) RRJ policy indicates that incidents of sexual abuse or harassment are considered when evaluating candidates for promotion.

(c) RRJ policy states that before hiring new employees, who may have contact with inmates, the agency: consistent with Federal, State, and local law, make its best efforts to contact any prior institutional employers for information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or any resignation during a pending investigation of an allegation of sexual abuse.

RRJ reported that in the past 12 months, the number of persons hired who may have contact with inmates who have had criminal background record checks was 67

(d) RRJ policy requires a criminal background records check before enlisting the services of any contractor who may have contact with inmates.

RRJ reported that in the past 12 months, the number of contracts for services where criminal background record checks were conducted on all staff covered in the contract who might have contact with inmates was 0

(e) RRJ policy requires criminal background records checks every five years of current employees and contractors who may have contact with inmates.

(f) The RRJ asks all applicants and employees who may have contact with inmates directly about previous misconduct described in paragraph (a) of this section in written applications or interviews for hiring or promotions

During the PREA Coordinator and PREA Compliance Manager's interviews they explained that PREA training is provided before new staff, contact staff or volunteers can have contact with inmates and again every two years. Additionally, they explained that staff receive training to deal with both male and female inmates and sign for the information they receive.

Random staff were asked questions related to training topics listed in the agency's lesson plan. Staff appeared knowledgeable of all topics. Staff understood their responsibilities, understood the dynamics of sexual abuse and articulated common reactions of sexual abuse victims. Staff had been trained to avoid inappropriate relationships with inmates. Staff understood the agency's reporting requirements and how to comply with relevant laws. Additionally, security staff member understood their responsibilities as first responders.

Site Review Observations:

Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The RRJ provides all staff with training which includes:

- The RRJ Zero-Tolerance policies concerning sexual misconduct
- How to fulfill their responsibilities under agency sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection, reporting, and response policies and procedures
- Inmates' right to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment
- The right of inmates and employees to be free from retaliation for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment
- The dynamics of sexual abuse and sexual harassment in confinement
- The common reactions of sexual abuse and sexual harassment victims
- How to detect and respond to signs of threatened and actual sexual abuse
- How to avoid inappropriate relationships with inmates
- How to communicate effectively and professionally with inmates, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender nonconforming inmates
- How to comply with relevant laws related to mandatory reporting

“All Riverside Regional employees will receive refresher training every two years to ensure knowledge of current Riverside Regional Jail sexual misconduct policies and procedures. In years in which an employee does not receive refresher training, the Riverside Regional Jail will provide refresher information on current sexual misconduct policies. All employees will acknowledge by signature confirmation that they understand the training received.”

(b) RRJ staff receives training tailored to the gender of the inmates, the facility houses male and female inmates and training records reviewed demonstrated a distinction in the training. All staff receives this training regardless of whether or not they are reassigned from another facility.

(c) All current employees who have contact with inmates have received training. A review of the staff training records and random staff interviews confirm training was received. The RRJ provided Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) Training Signature Sheets. The sign sheet includes a statement that staff have received and understand the information provided.

“Signing below indicates your understanding of the material presented in reference to the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA). By signing below, you also acknowledge a clear understanding that there is a zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual misconduct of any kind, you are aware that is your obligation to report any and all claims and that you have been informed that inmates may contact the James House.”

(d) The RRJ has completion reports which verify they have received the training and understand the training they have received. Upon completion of the lesson plan, staff is required to complete a test over the material.

The Auditor concluded the RRJ has appropriately trained staff and documented the employees' understanding of the training received. All facility staff interviewed were knowledgeable and retained the information provided through agency training efforts. The Auditor reviewed agency policies, procedures, lesson plans, training records, acknowledgement forms, and interviewed staff, and determined the facility meets the requirements of this standard. Based upon the review and analysis of all of the available evidence, the auditor has determined that the agency is fully compliant with this standard.

During the PREA Coordinator and PREA Compliance Manager's interviews they explained that PREA training is provided before new staff, contact staff or volunteers can have contact with inmates and again every two years. Additionally, they explained that staff receive training to deal with both male and female inmates and sign for the information they receive.

During interviews with contract staff and volunteers. The Auditor asked each contractor if they had been provided training by the facility prior to having contact with inmates. Each informed the Auditor they attended an orientation prior to beginning work in the facility. The Auditor questioned each regarding specific requirements of this standard to gain an understanding of the training provided to determine if the training was retained. Contractors and volunteers were able to articulate their responsibilities under the agency's sexual abuse and sexual harassment policies, how to report allegations, and were aware of the agency's zero-tolerance policy.

(a) RRJ policy requires "All RRJ employees, contracted personnel, and volunteers who may have contact with inmates will receive instruction related to:

(a) All volunteers and contractors who have contact with inmates have been notified of the agency's zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and harassment.

Volunteers and contractors are informed how to report such incidents. The level and type of training provided to volunteers and contractors is based on the services they provide and level of contact they have with inmates and their training is tailored during orientation.

The number of volunteers and contractors, who may have contact with inmates, who have been trained in agency's policies and procedures regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection, and response is 91

(b) RRJ volunteers and contract staff receives training tailored to the gender of the inmates, the facility houses male and female inmates and training records reviewed demonstrated a distinction in the training.

(c) The RRJ maintains documentation confirming that volunteers and contractors understand the training they have received. Upon receipt of the PREA information, volunteers and contractors are required sign and acknowledge they understand the material. A review of the volunteer and contract staff training records confirm training was received. The RRJ provided Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) Training Signature Sheets. The sign sheet includes a statement that staff have received and understand the information provided.

"Signing below indicates your understanding of the material presented in reference to the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA). By signing below, you also acknowledge a clear understanding that there is a zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual misconduct of any kind, you are aware that is your obligation to report any and all claims and that you have been informed that inmates may contact the James House."

The Auditor concluded the agency provides appropriate training to volunteers and contract staff. The agency's training curriculum is appropriate to ensure compliance with this standard. The agency maintains documentation that volunteers and contractors have received training. The Auditor reviewed the agency's policies, training curriculum, training records, and interviewed contractors and volunteers and determined the agency meets the requirements of this standard. Based upon the review and analysis of all of the available evidence, the auditor has determined that the agency is fully compliant with this standard.

During interviews with intake staff who conduct the initial education and facility orientation they explained that initial education is provide to each inmate as they arrive at the facility and how accommodations can be made if needed. Specifically, information could be read to individuals who are blind or cannot read the information themselves. They also stated that materials were available in Spanish and that interpretive services are available if needed. Additionally, they pointed out that the PREA video is played on a loop in the intake area.

During inmate interviews, most indicated they received PREA information during the intake process and signed for the information they received. Although most inmates indicated they received education materials during the intake process, few were able to articulate what outside services were available or even if that information was included.

Site Review Observations:

Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) During the intake process, Inmates view the PREA video on a loop in the waiting area and Intake and Classification staff provide all inmates with a Riverside Regional Jail Sexual Assault Prevention Pamphlet. The pamphlet includes RRJ's zero-tolerance policy, how to make a report and how to access outside services. Each inmate signs a "New Intake Information Form" which explains RRJ's zero-tolerance policy towards sexual abuse and sexual harassment, right to be free from abuse, harassment and retaliation for reporting such conduct. Additionally, the form explains that phone calls may be monitored, the fees that are charged for incarceration, and how to obtain medical services.

The number of inmates admitted during past 12 months who were given this information at intake is 1056.

(b) Within 30 days, inmates receive comprehensive PREA education in the Classification Unit before going to general population. However, it was determined that the 30-Day comprehensive education is not being documented anywhere.

The RRJ reported the number of those inmates admitted during the past 12 months (whose length of stay in the facility was for 30 days or more) who received comprehensive education on their rights to be free from both sexual abuse and sexual harassment and retaliation for reporting such incidents and on agency policies and procedures for responding to such incidents within 30 days of intake was 2409

(c) RRJ reported that all inmates receive PREA related materials including those transferred from another facility.

(d) Accommodations for inmates with special needs can be made if needed. Specifically, information can be read to individuals who are blind or cannot read the information themselves. They also stated that materials were available in Spanish and that interpretive services are available through VIANCE if needed. Signs including the PREA hotline are available in braille. Additionally, the RRJ Inmate Handbook is available in English, Spanish, Braille, Large Print, and Audio.

(e) RRJ maintains documentation of inmate participation in the PREA education in the inmate file. Ten (10) files were reviewed during the onsite audit. All files had documentation of the inmate's initial education however, no documentation of 30 comprehensive education was documented. This was discussed with the PREA Coordinator and leadership staff during the close out.

(f) RRJ provides additional educational materials in inmate housing units and common areas in the form of posters. Additionally, the facility has tablets and kiosks in all housing units that also have additional PREA information on them. The facility tour confirmed the existence of additional materials in housing units and common areas.

During the tour of the facility postings with reporting information were observed posted on walls in multiple locations, additional information was also available on tablets and kiosks.

Corrective Action:

Within 30 days, inmates receive comprehensive PREA education in the Classification Unit before going to general population. However, it was determined that the 30-Day comprehensive education is not being documented anywhere.

Update:

As of May1st, 2023 the RRJ has provided documentation showing inmates sign off on comprehensive PREA education received while in the

- Key Control
- Sexual Misconduct

- Emergency Procedures
- Suicide Prevention

(b) The portion of the standard is Not Applicable, all forensic exams would be conducted at VCU Medical Center. Staff interviews confirmed this information.

(c) The RRJ maintains documentation that medical staff has received the training referenced in this standard. Training records were reviewed and compliance has been met.

The Auditor concluded medical and mental health staff at the RRJ are appropriately trained. The facility maintains documentation that medical and mental health staff have received specialized medical training. The Auditor conducted a review of agency policies, procedures, training curriculum, training records, interviewed medical and mental health staff and determined the agency meets the requirements of this standard.

Interviews with the PREA Coordinator and PREA Compliance Manager indicated that risk screenings are being completed during the intake process, usually within a couple hours but always before the inmate is transferred to the Classification Unit.

Reassessments are completed on inmates identified as "at-risk" on a regular basis but always within 30 days.

Interviews conducted with Admissions and Classification staff indicated the intake screenings are completed in a private location and are typically completed within two hours of admission but definitely take place within 72 hours of arrival at the facility. Reassessments are completed on inmates identified as "at-risk" on a regular basis but always within 30 days. Additionally, Classification staff stated that OPR will notify them of any new information that would trigger a reassessment such as new charges are a PREA investigation.

Targeted inmate interviews confirmed intake screenings are being completed in Admissions upon intake and that they are met with regularly by the PREA Coordinator and that they are reassess and asked screening questions every 30 days.

Random inmate interviews confirmed intake screenings are being completed in Admissions upon intake but none indicated they had been reassessed within 30 days.

Site Review Observations:

Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The RRJ assesses all inmates during admission for their risk of being sexually abused by other inmates or sexually abusive toward other inmates. RRJ policy states:

"All inmates shall be assessed during the intake screening to classify and assign housing based on many variables to include their risk of being sexually abused by other inmates or sexually abusive toward other inmates. This intake screening shall consider, at a minimum, the following criteria to assess inmates for housing and their

risk of sexual victimization (4-ALDF-2A-30; 6VAC15-40-120, §115.41(a), PREA §115.41)”

The auditor observed the intake and classification process during the onsite visit. The initial screening was done within a few hours and was completed in a private area.

(b) RRJ Classification SOP requires: *“The classification interview will be conducted in a private area within seventy-two (72) hours of inmate committal excluding weekends and holidays (PREA §115.41).”*

The number of inmates entering the facility (either through intake or transfer) within the past 12 months whose length of stay in the facility was for 72 hours or more and who were screened for risk of sexual victimization or risk of sexually abusing other inmates within 72 hours of their entry into the facility was 4234

(c) The PREA screening assessments are conducted using an objective screening tool (RRJ Sexual Predation and Victimization Assessment/Reassessment Form) which was verified by the auditor during the onsite visit. The screening tool is point additive, each of the questions is assigned a value which when added scores the individual’s risk of predation or victimization as low, moderate or elevated. Information gathered during the assessment is used to ensure those with a high predation score are kept separate from those with a high victimization score.

(d) The intake screening tool considers the following criteria to assess inmates for risk of sexual victimization

- Whether the inmate has a mental, emotional, physical, or developmental disability to include any medical requirements
- The age of the inmate
- The physical build of the inmate
- Whether the inmate has previously been incarcerated
- Criminal history and whether the inmate's criminal history is exclusively nonviolent
- Previous incidents of escape or assaultive behavior
- Whether the inmate has prior convictions for sex offenses against an adult or child
- Whether the inmate is or is perceived to be gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender nonconforming
- Whether the inmate has previously experienced sexual victimization
- Any need for protection or to be kept separate from other inmates, or the inmate's own perception of vulnerability
- Gender
- Whether the inmate is detained solely for civil immigration purposes

When assessing inmates for risk of being sexually abusive, the RRJ initial PREA risk screening considers the following:

- Previous assaultive history while in custody

- Previous history of sexual assault, contact, or harassment while in custody
- Documented sex offender registration
- Current criminal charges of a sexual or assaultive nature
- Previous criminal charges of a sexual or assaultive nature
- Institutionally comfortable
- Juvenile Incarceration
- Known gang affiliation and/or documented history of aggressive behavior
- Under 35 years of age
- Admits to previous history of sexual activity with the same sex
- Substantiated PREA Investigation during this incarceration

(e) RRJ Classification SOP considers prior acts of sexual abuse, prior convictions for violent offenses, and history of prior institutional violence or sexual abuse, as known to the agency, in assessing inmates for risk of being sexually abusive.

(f) RRJ Classification SOP requires that: Within thirty (30) days from arrival at the facility, At Risk Population inmate's will be reassessed to review the inmate's risk of victimization or abusiveness based upon any additional, relevant information received by the facility since the intake screening (§115.41). It was found that not all inmates are being reassessed within 30-days, only those inmates found to be "At-Risk" are being reassessed as required by the standard. This was discussed with the PREA Coordinator and again with the leadership team at the close out.

The number of inmates entering the facility (either through intake or transfer) within the past 12 months whose length of stay in the facility was for 30 days or more and who were reassessed for their risk of sexual victimization or of being sexually abusive within 30 days after their arrival at the facility based upon any additional, relevant information received since intake was 2409

(g) RRJ Classification SOP requires *"An inmate's risk level shall be reassessed when warranted due to a referral, request, incident of sexual abuse, or receipt of additional information that bears on the inmate's risk of sexual victimization or abusiveness (§115.41)."*

(h) The RRJ Classification SOP states that inmates may not be disciplined for refusing to answer, or for not disclosing complete information in response to the risk screening questions. Interviews conducted with staff reiterated that inmates would be not disciplined for refusing to answer the screening questions.

(i) The RRJ has implemented appropriate controls on the dissemination within the facility of responses to questions asked pursuant to this standard in order to ensure that sensitive information is not exploited to the inmate's detriment by staff or other inmates. That information is kept in a restricted area and only authorized staff can access the information. Information stored in the Jail Management System is password protected.

Corrective Actions:

The Auditor conducted formal interviews with two transgender inmates. Each was asked if they had been placed in a unit that houses only gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and intersex inmates. The inmates stated they had not been housed in such a unit. They also indicated that they meet regularly with the PREA Coordinator and allowed to shower separately from other inmates. The Auditor conducted a formal interview with classification staff. Prior to making housing placements they stated that screening information is reviewed to ensure inmates are protected from likely abusers. The PREA Coordinator was asked how often transgender or intersex inmates' placement were reviewed. The Auditor was informed they are reviewed each month.

Site Review Observations:

Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The RRJ uses information from the risk screening required by § 115.41, with the goal of keeping separate those inmates at high risk of being sexually victimized from those at high risk of being sexually abusive, to inform: housing assignments, bed assignments, work assignments, education assignments and program assignments

(b) The RRJ makes individualized determinations about how to ensure the safety of each inmate based on information gathered during the risk screening. Random staff interviews confirmed that all information gathered is used to ensure the safety of each inmate.

(c) When deciding whether to assign a transgender or intersex inmate to a facility for male or female inmates, The RRJ Multidisciplinary Treatment Team (MDTT) determines the inmates housing assignment after review of the inmate records, assessments and an interview with the inmate.

(d) RRJ At-Risk Inmate Population Policy 20.2 requires that placement and programming assignments for each transgender or intersex inmate is reassessed during the monthly Multidisciplinary Treatment Team meeting.

(e) RRJ staff meets with transgender or intersex individuals to discuss the inmate's own views with respect to his or her own safety and will give serious consideration when making facility and housing placement decisions and programming assignments.

(f) Transgender inmates at the RRJ are given the opportunity to shower separately from other inmates.

(g) The RRJ does not place lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex inmates in dedicated facilities, units, or wings solely on the basis of such identification or status, unless such placement is in a dedicated facility, unit, or wing established in connection with a consent decree, legal settlement, or legal judgment for the purpose of protecting such inmates. The RRJ does not have a dedicated unit or wing solely on the basis of identification or status.

The Auditor concluded staff is making individualized determinations when assigning

The Auditor conducted formal interviews with random staff. Each staff member was asked if they are required to accept any and all reports, knowledge and suspicion of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Staff answered they were. Staff were asked how quickly they are required to report the allegation. Each staff member stated they are required to report the allegation immediately. The Auditor asked each if they were required to document the allegation. The Auditor was informed staff is required to submit a report to document the allegation. Staff was asked how they could privately report allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment of inmates. Staff stated they could privately report an allegation of sexual abuse and sexual harassment of an inmate by calling the PREA hotline or talking to a supervisor. Staff informed the Auditor command staff is available if they wished to privately report an allegation.

The Auditor conducted formal interviews with contract staff. Each was asked what actions they would take if they received information from an inmate regarding an allegation of sexual abuse or sexual harassment. The Auditor was informed they would notify security immediately. The Auditor asked each if they were required to document information they receive regarding sexual abuse or sexual harassment. Each stated they would be required to write a report about the allegation. Each informed the Auditor they are required to report any and all information, knowledge, or suspicion regarding sexual abuse or sexual harassment of inmates.

The Auditor conducted formal interviews with inmates. The Auditor asked inmates to explain the various ways available for making a report of sexual abuse or sexual harassment. Collectively, inmates stated they can tell a staff member, write a request on the kiosk, or have someone else make a report for them. The Auditor asked each if there were staff, they felt confident they could report an allegation of sexual abuse or sexual harassment to. Most stated they would tell a staff member if they wanted to make an allegation of sexual abuse or sexual harassment. When asked if the inmates felt the allegation would be kept confidential most inmates felt staff would maintain confidentiality. The Auditor asked each inmate if they were able to make an allegation without having to give their name. The inmates interviewed understood they could make an allegation anonymously.

Site Review Observations:

Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The RRJ provides materials that discuss how to report sexual abuse, sexual harassment and retaliation. Inmates are provided and sign for an RRJ Sexual Assault Prevention Pamphlet at intake which instructs inmates that *“If you are the victim, witness or possess knowledge of any act of Sexual Misconduct by another inmate, staff member, or visitor please inform someone as soon as possible so that assistance can be provided to you. You can speak with any staff member you feel comfortable in speaking with, or leave a toll-free message for jail investigators at (804) 504-7887 on the inmate telephone system.”* If you do not feel comfortable in speaking with any jail staff you can call or write the following agencies for assistance:

The Sexual Assault Prevention Pamphlet also has the main number, address and website for the jail itself. The inmate handbook contains the same information as the pamphlet and is available on the housing unit kiosks and tablets.

During the facility tour signs were seen in housing units and most common areas.

The signs were in English and Spanish and stated *“STOP SEXUAL ABUSE NOW”* and that the Riverside Regional Jail is a zero-tolerance facility. The signs also had the internal reporting hotline number which goes directly to investigators. Additionally, the PREA hotline number is posted by each inmate phone.

Both the internal reporting hotline and the number to the James House were tested from the housing unit phones and by the auditor’s cell phone. Housing unit phones require a pin number but when received by investigators no identifying information appears. Use of an outside phone goes directly through to both internal investigators and the James House. Access to inmate phones is during normal dayroom hours (0700 - 2130). Inmates in special management have access to phones during their recreation time.

(b) The RRJ instructs inmates that they can contact The James House to report

sexual abuse and/or harassment if they are uncomfortable with reporting internally. Information about the James House is found in the Sexual Assault Prevention Pamphlet, Inmate Handbook, and on the housing unit kiosks and tablets.

(c) RRJ policy states: *“Riverside Regional Jail employees possessing knowledge of incidents or criminal acts of sexual misconduct are required to make notification immediately following the receipt of information made verbally, in writing, anonymously, and from third parties to their Supervisor or higher-ranking officials. This information must be forwarded to the facility's Office of Professional Review.”*

(d) The RRJ policy allows staff to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of inmates. *“Employees are provided the option to make anonymous reports through the use of the facility Information Directory under the Misconduct Reporting link. This link also contains information regarding third-party reporting options (The James House) for staff to include a 24-hour external hotline (804.458.2840) and the facility sexual misconduct messaging hotline (804.504.7887).”*

The facility provides multiple ways for inmates to report allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, staff neglect and retaliation, including an outside private entity. The facility requires staff to accept, report, and document all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The Auditor reviewed the agency’s policies, procedures, Inmate Handbook, Inmate education materials, staff training materials, Zero-Tolerance Poster, Memorandum of Understanding, Investigative records, training records, and interviewed staff and inmates and determined the facility meets the requirements of this standard. Based upon the review and analysis of all of the available evidence, the auditor has determined that the agency is fully compliant with this standard.

The Auditor conducted formal interviews with inmates. Each inmate was asked if the facility provides them with contact information of a community organization that provides emotional support services to sexual abuse victims. Not all inmates interviewed were aware of the community support services. The inmates who stated they were not aware were asked if they have noticed posters on the walls in the living units and other areas in the facility. The inmates had noticed information posted on the walls and stated they have not read them. Those inmates were also asked if they were provided information during the intake process and if received an Inmate Handbook. They had been provided each but stated they have not read the information.

Site Review Observations:

Observations during on-site review of physical plant

(a) The RRJ provide inmates with access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse by giving inmates a Riverside Regional Jail Sexual Assault Prevention Pamphlet during the intake process. The pamphlet includes RRJ's zero-tolerance policy, how to make a report and how to access the James House for support services. During intake, inmates are provided the James House toll-free hotline number (804) 458-2704) and it is available in the inmate handbook on the kiosk and tablets.

(b) The RRJ has an MOU with the James House to provide inmates with access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse. The MOU states the James House agrees to the following:

- Services are free and confidential.
- Provide twenty-four-hour telephone crisis intervention counseling via our 24-hour hotline.
- Upon request of the victim or someone calling on behalf of the victim, have a trained advocate provide services to victims at forensic programs, hospitals, or law enforcement agency within a reasonable period of time.
- Provide crisis intervention counseling, advocacy, information and referrals to victims of sexual violence detained in RRJA.
- If possible, provide legal advocacy to victims of sexual violence who participate in protective order hearings, preliminary hearings, sentencing hearings and any other relevant legal proceedings.
- Report all services provided to detained sexual violence victims to an assigned point of contact at the RRJA.
- Provide allied professional training as requested by the RRJA.

The staff was able to clearly articulate during the interviews the importance of keeping the information confidential.

(c) The RRJ does not have in house medical or mental health staff. However, the RRJ has provided information to community health providers to inform inmates of the practitioner's duty to report, and the limitations of confidentiality, at the initiation of services

(d) The RRJ does not regularly house inmates under the age of 18, if the victim is considered a vulnerable adult staff must report the allegation to the designated State or local services agency under applicable mandatory reporting laws

(e) RRJ staff report all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, including third-party and anonymous reports, to the Office of Professional Responsibility for investigation. Staff interviewed were aware of their reporting responsibilities.

Interviews with OPR confirm that the credibility of an alleged victim, suspect or witness is on an individual basis and not on the basis of that individual's status as an inmate or staff.

Interviews with command staff reveal the facility recommends termination of a staff member who engages in sexual abuse with an inmate.

Each individual interviewed was aware of the agency's zero-tolerance policy and discipline sanctions for violating those policies. Each was aware they would be removed from contact with inmates following an allegation of sexual abuse and would be removed from facility access if found to have engaged in such acts. They were also aware the facility reports such actions to law enforcement for criminal investigation.

(e) The RRJ will discipline an inmate for sexual contact with staff only upon a finding that the staff member did not consent to such contact.

(f) For the purpose of disciplinary action, a report of sexual abuse made in good faith based upon a reasonable belief that the alleged conduct occurred shall not constitute falsely reporting an incident or lying, even if an investigation does not establish evidence sufficient to substantiate the allegation.

(g) The RRJ has a zero tolerance policy concerning sexual contact.

The Auditor discovered the agency maintains policies that align with PREA standard 115.78 Discipline Sanctions for Inmates. Facility personnel ensure the policy is applied when choosing whether to discipline an inmate for reporting or participating in an act of sexual abuse. The Auditor reviewed the facility's policies, procedures, investigative records, interviewed staff, medical and mental health practitioners. Based upon the review and analysis of all of the available evidence, the auditor has determined that the agency is fully compliant with this standard.

The Auditor conducted formal interviews with medical and mental health staff. Medical practitioners stated they complete a medical screening for every inmate during the intake process. The Auditor asked if mental health staff are notified of inmate that discloses prior abuse. Both stated mental health does meet with those inmates within 14 days for a follow up.

Medical staff stated they only share victimization information with mental health personnel. The Auditor asked who has access to medical records. The Auditor was informed only medical personnel have access. Each was asked what they would do if they felt they needed to share information regarding victimization. The Auditor was informed medical personnel would ask for written informed consent from the inmate before doing so. Both medical and mental health staff informed the Auditor they are mandatory reporters concerning sexual victimization of a youthful inmate.
